Bond and CCPD election set for Nov. 7

In November 2017, Cedar Hill voters will consider two programs:

1) **the issuance of \$45 million in general obligation bonds**, without a property tax rate increase, to finance infrastructure, parks and recreation, and library improvements to be initiated over the next five to seven years.

2) **continuing to fund the Cedar Hill Crime Control and Prevention District (CCPD)**. The CCPD designates 1/8 of one percent of existing sales tax revenue to fund crime prevention initiatives; this proposition does not propose an additional tax.

Bond Program

Since the last city bond referendum in 2003, our community has grown substantially.

Citizen input from surveys and participation in master plans indicates a desire for expanded library facilities, public pool improvements, more accessible parks and trails, and improvements to sidewalks, streets, and drainage for our growing population.

Based on this feedback, the City Council appointed residents to a Citizen Bond Review Committee in January 2017. The City Council reviewed their recommendations and financial implications and set a bond election on November 7,

2017 to ask voters to consider the following propositions:

A) **\$10 million for Streets & Drainage**, including repair and improvement of roadways and drainage facilities throughout the city; signals and equipment to help ease traffic congestion; installation of street lights for safety; sidewalks, ramps, and push buttons for pedestrian crossings; and landscaping, hardscaping, and lighting improvements along the Hwy. 67 corridor.

B) **\$20 million for a new Library Facility** to replace the current 10,000 sq. ft. library with a facility of approximately 46,000 sq. ft. for current and future needs. It would include technological enhancements, flexible program space,

C) **\$15 million for Parks & Recreation Improvements**, including improvement of neighborhood and community parks and playgrounds in compliance with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) standards; update of the creative play structure in Virginia Weaver Park for children with special needs; repairs and improvements to the Senior Center;



replacement of Crawford Park Pool; construction of the initial phase of a centrally located signature community park to provide amenities and programming for residents and visitors; and construction of multi-use trails.

The expenditures authorized in the bond election would be funded by General Obligation Bonds, which are repaid by property taxes.

It is anticipated that this program would not require an increase in the property tax rate, based on the retirement of existing debt and anticipated increases in taxable property value over the next five to seven years.

The city's previous bond program, approved in 2003, was also completed without an increase in the property tax rate. These projections are based on current financial conditions, trends, and forecasts and may change based on future market and economic conditions.

Continue funding CCPD

Voters will also be asked to consider extending the Crime Control and Prevention District for an additional 15 years. Approved by voters in 2012, the CCPD designates 1/8 of one percent of sales tax revenues to fund community safety and crime prevention initiatives. Since creation of the CCPD, the overall crime index rate has decreased by 10 percent.



Since 2015, Cedar Hill has continuously introduced technology to help residents easily monitor and thereby control their water usage. This technology makes it possible to transact all utility business without leaving home.

The City has moved to a customer-centric service model, giving the customer complete choice on when and how they transact utility business; and how much they pay each month.

Fathom's recently enhanced customer service portal, Fathom U2You, allows customers to track and monitor their water consumption in near real time, set consumption alerts and alert thresholds, and pay their utility bill online. Consumption data is downloadable and can be monitored across variable date ranges, compared to previous periods and compared to similar users.

Customers can access this recently-improved portal and phone app by

following these instructions:

Portal: <https://cedarhill.u2you.gw-fathom.com>. For new users, locate and click on the "Sign up" menu item at the bottom left of the home page and follow the instructions on the Sign-up page. If you registered on the old site, use the same log-on credentials you used previously for the portal (not the usage history log-on).

Once at the site, you'll be asked to complete a short survey to reestablish your residential parameters so you can be compared to the correct comparable households.

Smart Phone App: If you've downloaded the old app, delete it, then download the new app (FATHOM U2You Mobile) from the Apple Store (iOS) or Google Play Store (Android). If previously registered, your old log-on credentials will work with the new app.

BBQ helps get this fire engine going

What does it take to restore an old fire engine that served the Cedar Hill community in the middle of the last century? Apparently a lot of barbecue helps.

The Cedar Hill Fire Historical Society with cooperation from the Cedar Hill Fire Department is raising money for the restoration of the Fire Department's 1924 American LaFrance Fire engine.

They will host a Barbecue cook-off fundraiser on Saturday, October 7 at Virginia Weaver Park (631 Somerset Dr.) from 11 a.m. 'til dark.

Grab some barbecue and donate to a good cause.

The Fire Department hopes to completely restore the engine to its original glory. When restored, the engine will be one of very few fully-functional museum and parade-ready antique fire engines.

The antique engine has already participated in notable events such as the Adolphus Christmas Parade, Cedar Hill's Big Machine Expo and Christmas parade, and Dallas's 911 stair climb.

Under the leadership of Chief Charles Ray Sims, the Cedar Hill Fire Department (CHFD) purchased two 1924 American LaFrance Fire Engines from the Dallas Fire Dept. in 1953. In 1977, the one

remaining LaFrance owned by CHFD was sent to Huntsville Prison for restoration. Due to budget constraints, the truck was not painted the correct colors and gold leaf was not used on the fire truck.

In the late 1990s, the LaFrance fire truck was donated to a local museum to be displayed and refurbished. In 2014, CHFD reacquired the engine and volunteers have been restoring the engine as donations are available.
