



Solar: part of City's green initiative



You can't see them from the ground, but the solar panels installed on the roof of the Government Center will soon start cutting the City's electric bill by \$21,000 a year.

The system is roof-mounted and grid-tied. The solar panels are strategically located at the most prominent facility in Cedar Hill for maximum energy production and awareness to those living in and visiting the City.

Asst. City Manager Melissa Stephens began submitting grant applications in August, 2000 to fund most of this project. It will cost over \$900,000 to install the system and bring it online.

Federal, state and an Oncor grant covered all but \$25,000.

The City expects to save about \$21,000 a year in electricity costs at the government Center. It will take just over a year to recover

the City's portion of the cost.

The panels will provide about 8% of the electricity for the Government Center. And they will enhance local awareness of alternative energy uses.

An interactive video

panel in the lobby will show visitors exactly how much energy the solar panels are producing at any point in the day.

Cedar Hill is adopting an aggressive "green" strategy, encouraging residents

and businesses to look for ways to recycle, conserve energy and water resources, reduce emissions and increase efficiency.

Responsible consumption today will pay dividends now and well into the future.

Local firefighters battle fires at Possum Kingdom Lake

Fire officials from across the state meet in Cedar Hill

During recent months, several teams of Cedar Hill firefighters have been dispatched to assist Texas Forest Service teams as they battled wildfires in the North Texas region.

In addition to firefighters, Cedar Hill also sent the new brush truck which was delivered earlier this year. This vehicle was designed to help provide access to wildfires not accessible from city streets and highways.

"The fire at Possum Kingdom was more intense and larger than anything that I have seen in 20 years of firefighting," said Cedar Hill Captain Chris Tancred. "We were working side by side with the federal forest fighters, they said that they had not seen fires like this in all the fires they had worked."

The Cedar Hill Fire Department is working with the Texas Forest Service to develop a program to educate property owners about how to protect homes

and buildings from wildfires. With some simple changes to the area around your home you can make the difference between saving your home and losing it from wildfire.

Fire Chief John Ballard said "The Texas Forest Service will be providing training to members of the Cedar Hill Fire Department, under the Community Wildfire Protection Plan, to assist homeowners in creating a plan to make their homes defensible in case of a wildfire."

Officials meet

With wildfires having charred about 2.7 million acres of the state since the fall, Cedar Hill hosted a Texas Forest Service meeting in June for about 80 fire officials from across the state.

During the two-day briefing, Forest Service officials gave an update on the wildfire threat

that has put thousands of communities at risk, according to Nick Harrison of the Texas Forest Service.

The sessions included updates on current conditions and tips on damage prevention. Forest Service officials are talking to local leaders so they can pass the information on to residents.

Home owners can help prevent wildfire damage by creating a safety zone of at least 30 feet around buildings.

"If you've got cedars [Ashe junipers] up around your house, we suggest you move them out at least 30 feet ... or at least trim them up," Harrison said.

He also suggested property owners keep grass cut at a maximum height of 4 inches within 100 feet of a building.

"Grass is the main carrier of fire, either to the trees or the house," Harrison said.

Officials say they are trying to better prepare their communities as neighborhoods expand into undeveloped areas.

Hot dogs are not cool

Dogs are particularly prone to heatstroke during the hot summer months. If not treated immediately it is often fatal.

Heatstroke can occur when animals are kept in a poorly venti-



lated garage or kennel on a hot day, confined in the hot sun without proper shade, ventilation, or access to plenty of fresh water, or are over-exercised in the heat of the day.

Dogs left tethered out in the yard are prime candidates for heat exhaustion. They may become entangled and unable to get to shade or water.

If your dog has heat stroke he will begin to show excessive panting, pale gums, a bright red tongue, rapid heart rate, thick saliva, vomiting and breathing difficulties.

These symptoms will be followed by collapse, coma and death.

Contact your vet immediately if your dog is experiencing any of these symptoms.

Prevention is the best cure for heatstroke, so keep your dog safe by keeping him cool.

Free wireless internet connection is available at the Zula B. Wylie Public Library and at the Cedar Hill Recreation Center.



No watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. seven days a week from May 1 to Sept. 30

From May 1 to September 30, outdoor watering is prohibited between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Fines for violators start at \$200 for the first offense.

The City requests no outside watering at all on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays to allow the system to re-

plenish supplies in the water storage tanks.

A City Council-appointed-committee, comprised of the Main Street Development and Preservation Board, and City Council members Cory Spillman and Wallace Swayze, began meeting with consultant Dan Sefko of Freese and Nichols in June to establish a vision and recommend strategies for transforming Old

Town into an attractive and economically vibrant destination.

“It is important to note that this is just the first step in a long-range planning process to introduce concepts, illustrations, ideas and strategies that will lay the groundwork for future development discussions,” said Planning Director, Rod Tyler.

MADD honors CHPD’s Cooley for DWI arrests

Cedar Hill’s Officer Chad Cooley recently received a 2010 Enforcement Hero Award presented by the Mother’s Against Drunk Driving (MADD).

The award was presented at a special luncheon hosted by MADD in Dallas.

The Enforcement Hero Award is presented to the officer in each police agency in Dallas County who had the highest number of arrests for Driving While Intoxicated (DWI).

During 2010, Offi-

cer Cooley arrested 22 drivers for DWI. This was the third time in as many years that Officer Cooley has received this award.

Officer Cooley is the Department Instructor for Standardized Field Sobriety Testing; a battery of tests offered to drivers to determine the severity of their impairment.

During 2010, Cedar Hill officers arrested 47 drivers for Driving While Intoxicated. So far, in 2011 30 arrests have been made.

PD: ‘Check out alarm sellers’

Cedar Hill police officials urge residents to make sure that any alarm salesperson, company or alarm installer that they hire is licensed by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Some alarm salespersons aggressively market their services primarily by going door

to door. If someone offering alarm-related services shows up at your door unsolicited, ask them for their DPS Private Security pocket card, which will also have their picture. Do not accept any other identification.
