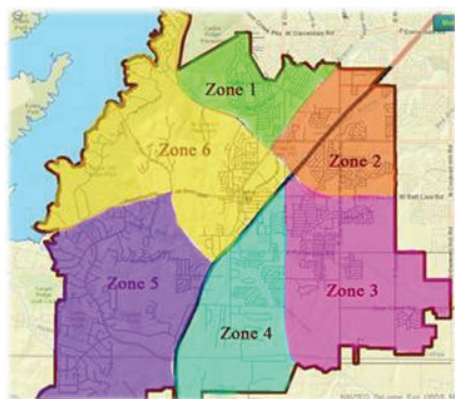

Woman of the Year

A standing ovation confirmed the popularity of the Cedar Hill Chamber of Commerce's selection of our Melissa Stephens as 2013 Woman of the Year.

She received her award at the Chamber's annual meeting in January. She was introduced by Billie Ballengee, Woman of the Year for 2012.

Ballengee was flanked by previous award winners as she talked about what a great city Cedar Hill is for women who want to be involved. She spoke of Melissa's amazing track record of getting things done for the city:

Melissa joined the City of Cedar Hill staff in 2003 and serves as Assistant City Manager. In her role she oversees citywide sustainability initiatives, the City's budget development process and the departments of Utility Billing, Tri-City Animal Shelter, Cedar Hill Public Library and Building Maintenance.

Along with ACM responsibilities, Melissa currently leads the City of Cedar Hill's various Growing Green Sustainability efforts. Her work has won grants worth over \$2 million for City-wide Green projects.

She has coordinated the City's Sustainability Master Plan, a recycle-focused solid waste contract, the installation of a solar panel system on

the roof of the Government Center to help reduce energy costs and a 4.5 kW wind turbine.

She drove the purchase of all-electric low-pollution Nissan Leaf vehicles and the acquisition of two grant-funded \$10,000 electric vehicle charging stations. She has overseen the acquisition of solar-powered trash and recycling compactors used in parks and other high traffic locations within the city.

Her current initiative is the city-wide water management and conservation AMI project which will make it possible for residents to monitor and control their own water usage.

Melissa is very passionate in seeing other women succeed and serve in leadership roles in and throughout the community. She leads various Women's History Month celebra-

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Dog at large...



Bad dog or a bad owner?

The Animal Control officers call them dogs at large. Most of us call them “off the leash” or “loose dogs in the neighborhood”. Whatever you call them, dogs roaming loose are a hazard to other pets and to residents in the neighborhood. But who let the dogs out?

City ordinances forbid allowing a dog or cat to be at large within the city. Just letting the cat out for a minute at night or letting the dog off the leash to run in the park or in the front yard can earn a citation of over \$160 including court costs.

The reason for this ordinance is simple. Your pet may be very affectionate to you but can turn aggressive to a person or another animal. Residents can expect to enjoy parks, trails, sidewalks and other public places without being threatened or attacked by a loose animal.

City ordinances also say “If a dog or cat is found upon the premises of another person, the person may confine the dog or cat in a humane manner until the local animal control authority impounds the dog or cat.”

Once an animal is impounded, Animal Shelter staff will make efforts to contact the owner who will have to pay a fee of \$30 to \$100, plus a \$25 microchipping fee if one is not present. The owner will have to show proof of rabies vaccination within 3 business days and, if the animal is not sterilized, must show proof of such within 30 days.

What can you do?

Residents who spot loose animals should call Animal Control at the non-emergency number: 972.223.6111. Calls are answered 24 hours a day.

Don't put your neighbors, and their children at risk from an animal attack. Make sure your fence or enclosure is secure. Good neighbors control their animals. Do not let your dog off the leash to play in the park.

If you see a loose animal, take a minute and call it in. Do your part to keep your neighborhood safe.

Local Election Filing Deadline

Persons wishing to run for office in Cedar Hill's Regular Election, scheduled for May 10, 2014, must pick up a filing packet in the City Secretary's office, 285 Uptown Blvd., Fourth floor and returned required information to the same office by Feb. 28, 2014.

Positions to be elected in the General Election are City Council Place 2 (must reside West of Hwy 67, a 3-year term) currently held by Daniel C. Haydin, Jr. and City Council Place 6 (must reside East of Hwy 67, a 3-year term) currently held by Clifford Shaw.

Then there is a short survey, with live responses, about perceptions of City services. Residents can choose one of several smaller breakout groups for one-on-one meetings with City Council members.

These meetings are set at locations in all parts of the city to make attendance more convenient for residents. Officials hope for a good turnout so they can collect first-hand information about what it will take to strengthen neighborhoods.
