Over 100 relieved patrons returned library materials and brought in 1,161 food items to get their fines waived. The largest amount waived was \$500 and the smallest was 80 cents.



Residents east of US67 and west of Clark Road are invited to the next neighborhood meeting with the City Council, set for Tuesday, March 18.

Strong neighborhoods are the foundation of a strong city. Your Mayor and City Council members have scheduled six opportunities for residents to share concerns and dreams for their neighborhoods.

The two meetings so far have been well attended and residents have expressed their appreciation to City Council members and staff.

City services

At these meetings, hosted by Mayor Rob Franke and the members of the City Council, residents get a brief summary of the neighborhood services provided by many of the City's departments. Then there is a short survey, with live responses, about perceptions of City services.

Residents can then choose one of several smaller breakout groups for one-on-one meetings with City Council members.

Citizens' Fire Academy hands-on experience for the rest of us

Ever wonder what it is like to be a firefighter? Spend 10 weeks learning the ins and outs of the fire service.

Citizens' Fire Academy classes include CPR, using the "Jaws of Life," fire extinguisher training, learning about the equipment, and the actual extinguishment of a fire in the burn house.

The Citizens' Fire Academy will begin on March 27, 2014. Classes will be on Thursday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. for ten weeks. Graduation is on May 29, 2014.

Most of the classes will be held at the Cedar Hill Fire Department Central Station, located at 1212 W. Belt Line Rd. in Cedar Hill. However, there will be trips to offsite locations for live burns and tours.

There is no charge to the participants. All materials, along with a T-shirt, are provided.

Potential candidates for the Citizens Fire Academy must meet the following criteria:

- Minimum of 18 years of age
- Live or work in the city limits of Cedar Hill
- No prior felony convictions



City's EDC partners for small business

The City of Cedar Hill believes that when you succeed, our city succeeds, and we have found a way to support you. The Cedar Hill Economic Development Corporation has partnered with the Best Southwest Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and PeopleFund, a non-profit lender, to offer PeopleSpark, an innovative business education and loan readiness program targeting entrepreneurs in Cedar Hill.

PeopleFund's mission is to create economic opportunity and financial stability for underserved people by providing access to capital, education and resources to build healthy small businesses. The Best Southwest Small Business Development Center offers no-cost, one-on-one consulting for start-up and existing businesses on loans and financing, financial statement analysis, marketing, accounting and recordkeeping, sales, advertising, business planning, management and more.

Loan eligibility

PeopleSpark is a 6-month program for entrepreneurs which covers business feasibility, business planning, budget and projections, cash flow management and much more. In addition to the workshops, participants will have the opportunity to work with a business advisor from the Best Southwest SBDC. Participants, who graduate from the program in October, may be eligible for a small business loan from PeopleFund.

The program begins on April 12, 2014 and will be held at the Best Southwest SBDC, located at 207 N. Cannady Drive in Cedar Hill. For more information or to register for PeopleSpark, please contact the PeopleFund at 214-942-6698, or the SBDC at 972-860-7894.
