City Council sets sixth neighborhood Town Hall Meeting for Tues. May 20

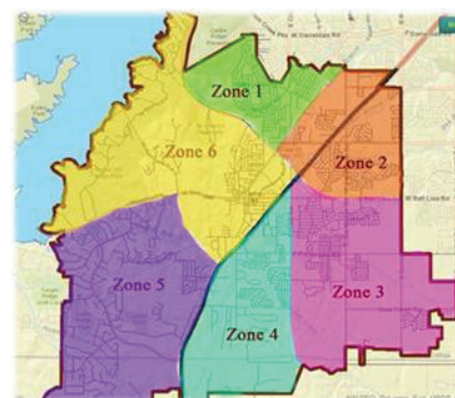
Residents of northwestern neighborhoods in the City (yellow portion of the map at right) are invited to meet with the City Council **Tuesday, May 20 at First United Methodist Church, 128 N. Roberts.** The meeting, starting at 6:30 p.m. is open to all residents.

Strong neighborhoods are the foundation of a strong city. Your Mayor and City Council members want to meet with residents to share information and hear residents' concerns and dreams for their neighborhoods.

The five previous Town Hall meetings have been well attended and residents have expressed their appreciation to City Council members and staff for the opportunity to learn about City services and speak directly to City Council members.

City services

At these meetings, hosted by Mayor Rob Franke and the members of the City Council, residents get a brief summary of the neighborhood services provided by many of the City's departments. Then there is a short survey, with live responses, about

Every Day is Earth Day in Cedar Hill

A record number of visitors learned how small changes can make a big impact at the City of Cedar Hill's fifth annual Earth Day April 21 at the Government Center. Over 500 attendees learned how they can help make every day Earth Day at the free family-friendly event.

Although traditionally held at the Zula B. Wylie Library, the change of location provided visitors with the opportunity to see the City's Big-Belly solar-powered recycling compactors, wind turbine and electric vehicle charging stations.

Exhibits displayed the City's plans for a legacy of sustainability through educational, interactive displays from several city departments including parks & recreation, public works, planning, tourism and the



library.

"Cedar Hill's approach to sustainability is to look at best practices and make them better," said Rhoda Savage, Director of Parks & Recreation. "We want Cedar Hill to serve as a model for other cities to emulate."

Several community organizations and vendors highlighted their environmentally-friendly services while attendees enjoyed barbecue and musical performances by Shades of Gray, the Bray Elementary Choir and Cedar Hill High School's Seven Saxes.

The City's NeighborWoods program made available a number of trees to residents and Keep Cedar Hill Beautiful and the Dogwood Canyon Audubon Center distributed flowering plants.

This year also marked the first year the City of Cedar Hill participated in the Earth Day Texas event at Fair Park in Dallas. The natural beauty and unique flora and fauna that call Cedar Hill home were highlighted by the City of Cedar Hill, Cedar Hill State Park and Dogwood Canyon Audubon Center. Community members showcased the City's unique cohesive approach to incorporating sustainable practices throughout the City from recycling to water conservation to urban conservation.

High school students hear from successful role models

Mayor Rob Franke, Maurice Wilson, Mike Parnell, and Kevin Franklin spoke to nearly 500 sophomores at Cedar Hill High School earlier this year. They were 1) encouraging them to make positive personal and educational choices; 2) encouraging

enrollment in career & technology courses; and 3) informing students about opportunities in manufacturing, technology, and entrepreneurship.

This event was organized by Principal Tammy Mariani, CTE Counselor Bob Robinette and Erica Molett, Cedar Hill EDC - Business Retention Manager.

Mayor Franke and Mr. Wilson (General Manager of Wal-Mart Distribution Center), spoke about the long-term impact choices have on

our future. They both shared personal stories of how negative choices impacted the lives of their families, friends, and themselves.

Mr. Wilson said, "I could have allowed others to label me, as a thug – period. But, I chose to change that period into a comma and add more to my life story including college graduate, business success, a servant to the community, and a father."

Kevin Franklin (IT Director for MDHA) and Mike Parnell (owner of P&W Machines) explained how businesses are waiting to hire skilled young people. Success can start with the technical courses offered at Cedar Hill High School.

They said manufacturing and technology industries are struggling to find skilled workers to replace their retiring workforce. They recommended CTE courses offered in high school.

Cellular telephone providers and the FCC are cooperating to send wireless emergency alerts (WEA) to your cell phones when warnings have been issued by the National Weather Service (NWS). These alerts will be sent via cell towers within or touching the severe weather polygon as defined by the NWS.

When you receive one of these weather alerts pay attention. Check local TV or radio or a good weather app for more information at the time of the event.

Emergency alerts sent to mobile



devices will include Tornado Warning, Extreme Wind Warning, Flash Flood Warning and Dust Storm Warning.

The four big cell provider networks (AT&T, Sprint-Nextel, Verizon and T-Mobile) have signed on for the program. If you have another carrier you may need to check with them for availability.
