West Nile Virus season is back

Protect yourself and your family; check the webpage above for prevention tips and news about spraying if WNV-positive samples are detected in Cedar Hill.

Dallas County Health and Human Services provides mosquito collection and testing services for Cedar Hill. They collect weekly samples in several locations in Cedar Hill.

If spraying is scheduled for any part of Cedar Hill, that information will be posted on the webpage above and the City will do mass calling in the affected area(s). Spraying is typically done late at night.

4D is the formula to reduce West Nile Virus exposure.

Drain

Remove breeding sites on your property. Drain standing water, cover trash containers so they won't hold water, change birdbaths, pet dishes and wading pools at least weekly, check boat tarps and grill covers for trapped water.

Dress

Wear long-sleeve, loose and lightly-colored clothing when outside.

DEET

Use repellents with DEET or other FDA approved repellents and follow instructions.

Dusk to dawn

Be aware that mosquitoes are most active from just before sunset until just after sunrise.



Cedar Hill #2 place to live in Dallas County says Dallas News

In a survey published recently by *The Dallas Morning News*, Cedar Hill was one of only two "neighborhoods" in Dallas County to be selected as best overall places to live.

The Sunday, May 18 issue of the paper contained a special section reviewing the best neighborhoods in the north Texas area.

The survey looked at several areas considered important to residents when they select a neighborhood.

Safety was the most important factor, followed by affordability, good schools, well-maintained and quiet, rising home values, pet-friendliness, places to shop and things to do, commute, walkability, attractive trees and landscaping and parks and green spaces.

While the survey included neighborhoods in Dallas, Denton, Collin, Rockwall and eastern Tarrant county

Watering restrictions

No watering from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week, May 1 to Sept. 30

From May 1 to September 30, outdoor watering between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. is prohibited by ordinance. Fines for violators start at \$200 for the first offense.

The City requests no outside watering at all on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays to allow the system to replenish supplies in the water storage tanks.

Any additional watering restrictions required under the City's Drought Response Stages will be posted on the home page of the City website, cedarhilltx.com, if they are put into effect.

Safety Fair reaches 500 HS seniors

Just before the Prom, Cedar Hill's Municipal Court partnered with several agencies and safety-related groups to hold a safety fair for seniors at Cedar Hill High.

Sakina Jackson, Municipal Court Juvenile Case Manager worked with Dr. Chandra McGhee, CHISD Director of Student Support and Community Services to bring together an interesting and educational experience for students, focusing on safety, especially alcohol and driving issues.

Students were able to visit with representatives and receive information from the Dallas District Attorney's Office, Drug Prevention

Resources Intervention, the Cedar Hill Police and Fire Departments, Agape Alcohol and Drug Education Program and Skillful Living.

Among the most popular educational experiences were a computer-simulator for driving and pedal cars provided by the Texas Dept. of Transportation that included "drunk goggles" that showed students how impaired their perception and control skills can become after just a small amount of alcohol.

According to Ms. Jackson, it was great to interact with students in a more positive way than in Juvenile Court.

She said the support of Cedar Hill Municipal Judge Michael Petty made this program possible.

Additional safety programs involving the City and CHISD are planned, starting in the Fall.

MADD honors CHPD for DWI enforcement

At a May City Council meeting, Cedar Hill Police officers were honored by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) for their strict DWI enforcement.

Cpl. Chad Cooley, left, received the Enforcement Hero award for making the most DWI arrests in Cedar Hill in 2013.

Officer Christine Hill, left center, received MADD's Commitment Hero for her dedication to DWI enforcement including standardized Field Sobriety testing training she conducts on her own time.

Overall, the department had a 77% increase in DWI arrests in 2013 over 2012.

Chief Steve Rhodes accepted the Commitment Hero Department award, one of three under this program sponsored by TxDOT.

It recognizes the Impaired Driving Investigations team progress toward a "No refusal" program that requires a blood sample from second DWI offenders.

the results were heavily skewed to the north with 23 of the top 25 Best Overall neighborhoods located in Collin, Denton and Tarrant counties.

Cedar Hill was the only one of the top 25 Best Overall neighborhoods located south of downtown Dallas and the one with the shortest commute to downtown. The other Dallas county neighborhood in the top 25 was Duck Creek in Garland.
