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Juneteenth Celebration set for Valley Ridge Park

The City of Cedar Hill is hosting the Best Southwest Area Juneteenth Celebration at Valley Ridge Park on June 16, 2007 from 4-10 pm.

Valley Ridge park is at 2850 Park Ridge Drive, just off Lake Ridge Parkway. Planners are

expecting 6,000 - 8,000 visitors at the one-day event. The cities of Cedar Hill, DeSoto, Duncanville, and Lancaster are collaborating on this event to include the entire regional community. This year's theme is

"Celebrating our Texas Heroes". Channel 8 News and their Family First Program will participate in the Juneteenth Celebration by providing advertising, posters, and live broadcasts the day of the event.

Channel 8 will be promoting the Juneteenth Celebration during a June 13 luncheon for Best Southwest mayors, council members and city managers in Duncanville. Plenty of

fun and exciting activities are planned for the Juneteenth Celebration at Valley Ridge Park.

One of the most interesting, popular and educational will be the Buffalo Soldiers Encampment which will feature demonstrations and an idea of the 19th century cavalry soldiers' lifestyle.

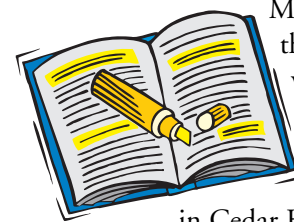

Guidebook for the future gets update

The Cedar Hill City Council has appointed a 30+ member steering committee to assist the city's consultant with a major overhaul of the Cedar Hill Comprehensive Plan. This would be the first such update since the Plan's adoption in 1999.



Members of the committee were selected to represent all constituencies in Cedar Hill.

The city uses the framework of the Comprehensive Plan to improve and sustain residential neighborhood quality and livability, and it establishes policies and guidelines intended to direct the present and future physical, social, and economic development of the City.

Wildwood earns Premier award

The City of Cedar Hill Neighborhood Advisory Board has chosen Wildwood as the Premier Neighborhood Award Recipient for 2007.

This community, nestled atop the escarpment overlooking Lake Ridge, includes about 240 residences. The Wildwood Homeowners Association, organized in 1986, reaches out to their neighborhood and the community through regular meetings, special events and volunteers.

“Cedar Hill is blessed with exceptional neighborhoods,” remarked Councilman Wade Emmert. “My family and I have lived in Wildwood for the past year and a half. The people we have come to know carry with them a keen sense of community consistent with the distinctive character for which Cedar Hill is known.”

Wildwood participates in the Parks Department, Adopt-a-Park program. “The property owners’ association had a parcel of land that had been deeded to them by the developer,” noted HOA President, Mike White. “We elected to not only donate the land, but to adopt the park once it was installed.” Since its completion last summer, Wildwood Neighborhood Park has been the site of a number of events including the Wildwood HOA Annual Fall Festival.

As this year’s Premier Neighborhood, Wildwood will receive a certificate of recognition, an award plaque, a feature on the City of Cedar Hill website, a permanent sign placed at the main entrance of the neighborhood and \$250 to be used for National Night Out festivities in August.

Well those days are back as the City of Cedar Hill and the Main Street Development and Preservation Board host Small Town Saturday Night, June 9 from 6 pm – 9 pm on the Historic Downtown City Hall Square.

Last year marked the return of Small Town Saturday Night where residents gathered in Pioneer Park to enjoy music, fun and the updated historic downtown streetscape improvements. “The historic district is becoming quite a unique destination with all

the recent improvements,” noted downtown business owner Frances Reed of Distinct Elegance Bridal, “and the period lighting makes the area much more pedestrian-friendly.”

This year’s event will feature old-fashioned games, a classic car show around City Hall, food, prizes, and live entertainment on the stage in Pioneer Park provided by Cedar Hill’s own Tim Jones Band.

Activities will begin at 6 pm and continue to 9 pm. Admission is FREE and everyone is invited to join in the fun.

To get to Historic Downtown travel west on Belt Line Road from U.S. Highway 67 to Main Street. Turn south on Main to Cedar. National Night Out August 1

The “24th Annual National Night Out”, a unique crime/drug prevention event, has been scheduled for Tues., August 7, 2007. The City of Cedar Hill, Neighborhood Services and the Cedar Hill Police Dept. are proud participants of this nationwide event.

Any crime prevention organization, community group or neighborhood association that was not officially registered with the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) for Night Out 2007 is invited to contact NATW now to receive information on National Night Out 2007.

There is no cost to register or participate. Once registered with NATW, local coordinators receive an organizational kit full of ‘how to’ materials including planning suggestions, sample news releases, artwork, and promotional guides – and interim updates throughout the year.

National Night Out, a year-long community building campaign, is designed to:

- Heighten crime prevention awareness
- Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs
- Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships
- Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back

Along with the traditional outside lights and front porch vigils, most cities and towns now celebrate National Night Out with a variety of neighborhood events such as block parties, cookouts, visits from local law enforcement and safety fairs.

Virus threatens local dogs

This area is experiencing an outbreak of Parvovirus among the dog population. It is important that you vaccinate your dog against this disease whether your dog is an indoor or outdoor dog. Taking your dog for a walk in the park can potentially expose him to this dangerous virus. Here are some facts about this deadly disease:

- Young dogs and puppies are more susceptible to the virus. The most vulnerable time is 2-6 months of age, however older dogs are at risk as well, especially if they are not vaccinated.
- The virus is extremely hardy and can survive up to 6 months in the environment; even in inclement weather.
- It is transmitted by the healthy dog ingesting feces from a dog with the virus. (Your dog can get the virus simply by walking in the area where a sick dog has been).
- Survival is possible but not guaranteed if caught and treated immediately. Treatment can be costly.
- Symptoms usually show up 7-10 days from contact with the virus and include vomiting and diarrhea followed by dehydration. Watch for a change in your dog's behavior. Lethargy and loss of appetite are often the first signs of Parvovirus.
- Prevention is by far the best medicine, so make sure to keep up with your dog's vaccinations.

If you suspect that your dog may be ill with this disease, contact your veterinarian immediately. For a list of local veterinarians, you can contact the Tri-City Animal Shelter at (972)291-5335.

Neighborhood Matching Grant funds available

Cedar Hill neighborhood organizations are invited to take advantage of project funding offered through the Neighborhood Services Department. The Neighborhood Matching Grant Program provides matching funds for eligible neighborhood organization and business association projects. Grant funding is available on a 50/50 match basis, up to \$1,000, for a neighborhood sponsored project. Each

application is reviewed by the Neighborhood Advisory Board (NAB) and requires City Council approval.

Applications for grant projects are required to meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Strengthen and improve neighborhood organizations
- Improve the appearance of neighborhoods

- Advance inter-neighborhood cooperation.

“Grant funds are currently available and members of the NAB are ready to assist with the application,” remarked NAB Chairman David Boatwright. The Board is accepting applications virtually year round in hopes that the greater flexibility will make project planning easier and more convenient for applicants.

The NAB will review applications for 2007 funds up to August 1, 2007. All grant-funded project components must be completed no later than fiscal year end September 30, 2007.

Grant projects may include, but are not limited to landscaping, seasonal decorations, safety equipment, beautification, park development and/or improvements, clean-up or after school activities, crime watch programs and neighborhood signage.

Neighborhood organizations are required to match the requested amount either with their own funds or in-kind services. Each neighborhood, including Public Improvement Districts, is eligible to receive one grant per fiscal budget year.

To be eligible for grant application a neighborhood organization must be registered with the City of Cedar Hill Neighborhood Services Department, must show proof of regular membership meetings, provide a copy of their bylaws or articles of incorporation that includes a list of officers, and an organization budget.

Music in Park enters 12th year

There's nothing like live music outdoors as dusk turns to evening. The Music in the Park concert series returns to the Lake Ridge Park amphitheater again this summer. Babe's Chicken roosts in City Hall

Babe's Chicken Dinner House is bringing its stick-to-your-ribs fare to Cedar Hill.

The home-cooking restaurant, which currently has five north Texas locations, first opened in Roanoke in 1993. It will take possession of the City Hall building on Cedar Street in July 2008 and will begin renovations. The city expects to move into offices in the new municipal building shared with Cedar Hill Independent School District in May 2008.

Paul Vinyard, the owner and proprietor of Babe's, estimates that the Cedar Hill location will draw 375,000 to 400,000 customers per year shortly after opening.

After \$14.5 million in renovations and improvements to its historic downtown area in the last few years, the city is focused on drawing people in.

“I know it's going to be tremendous, positive traffic in the downtown area, because Babe's doesn't take reservations and people will wait a long time to be seated, which will create a lot of foot traffic,” says Patty Bushart, neighborhood services/Main Street manager for Cedar Hill. Babe's will

hire six managers and 125 employees at the new location, many of whom will come from the local high school.

“Since we don't serve alcohol and we control cursing, we are one of the larger employers of teenagers, which helps build their personalities,” says Vinyard. “We try to teach them how to be a good employee so they can hold a job in the future.”

That involvement in the community is another reason why Cedar Hill found Babe's so enticing. Matthew Mabeol, president of Dallas hospitality consultancy Surrender Inc. said Cedar Hill is experiencing unprecedented population growth.

“Because it's a growing area, Cedar Hill is getting more chains, but some people don't want to eat at chains. They want authentic food, and Babe's certainly has figured out how to do high-quality home cooking.”

Some customers have been known to drive up to 45 minutes to dine on the family-style meals.

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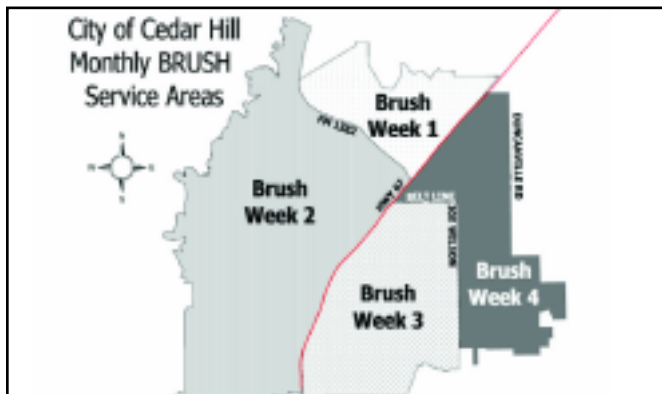

Brush and bulk curbside pick up



What is allowed:

- Ten cubic yards can be placed within 3 feet of curb.
- **Do not** have brush out earlier than 6 pm on the Friday before collection week to avoid a citation.
- For amounts over 10 cubic yards, please contact Waste Management to negotiate a pick up price.
- Brush need not be bundled.
- Brush may not exceed 4 ft. lengths or branches over 6 inches in diameter.
- Don't put brush on water meters or under power/phone lines.
- This service is not for residents utilizing professional tree trimming services, which must be removed by contractor.
