Changes coming in your water bill

In the near future you will notice a change in the look of your water bill from the City. The most important change is your new account number, effective Oct. 23.

Rates remain the same, and your billing and due dates are still the same.

After Oct. 23 you may need to contact your bank to advise them of your new account number if you use their autopay system.

If you pay using the City's online link it will look very different and you will need to enter your NEW account number.

You can continue to pay by mailing in a check or money order, by credit card over the phone with the Water Utilities Dept. or by visiting them in the Govern-

ment Center to pay in person, just note that you will have a NEW account number after Oct. 23.

Soon, you will probably see crews working their way down your street digging up old water meters, most of which are beyond their expected service life, and replacing them with new, more accurate meters. There is no charge to residents for the new meters.

One of the advantages of the new meters is that they send data from your meter directly to a data center in the Government Center. This system has proven to be more accurate and more efficient than manual meter readers.

Your data will be available to you online for your reference. You'll be able to better track your usage, so you can better manage your water bill.

Mayor's Teen Council begins second year

Mayor Rob Franke established the teen council last year in an effort to connect with city youth and give them a voice. The council, which meets twice per month, crosses generational, economic and demographic barriers between city staff and the students. Franke said the city budgets at least \$5,000 toward the Teen Council.

"We want [students] to understand that we think their opinions are important," Assistant City Manager Melissa Valadez-Stephens said.

Last year's session included leadership classes, discussions with city staff, tours of the police and fire departments, attending the Texas Youth Summit and planning of student-led initiatives.

Last year's session ended with the planning of two sustainability initiatives: leading a recycling com-

petition at elementary schools and planting fruit-bearing trees along Farm-to-Market Road 1820. Fruit harvested from the trees would be donated to food pantries.

"I want them to get to know how their city works on a much deeper level," said Franke, mayor for 17 years. "My hope is that they come out of this learning to love their city."

Only Cedar Hill high school students are eligible and are selected after an interview with Franke. The council draws mostly juniors and seniors.

Smart zoning conference set for Cedarhill

Cedar Hill officials, residents and the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) will meet with representatives from Smart Growth America on October 22 and 23, 2014, as part of a grant-funded technical assistance program focused on sustainable zoning codes.

City staff is partnering with NCTCOG and Smart Growth America to develop tools and strategies to create zoning codes. The vision for City Center encapsulates a mixed-use, walkable, and transit-oriented destination.

NCTCOG expects to use strategies developed during this workshop as a model for other communities in the Metroplex.

The workshop is open to the public and will begin at the Government Center's Court Room on the first floor, 285 Uptown Blvd., at 6 pm, Wednesday, Oct. 22.

Improvements along the roadway include new lanes and new pavement on almost the entire project and a hike/bike trail, sidewalks and drainage and erosion control projects.

house, how can we let
you know?**

Your City takes safety very seriously. So it is important to us that you are informed about important or potentially dangerous events. We make every effort to reach you, using an automated phone system that can dial hundreds of residents' phones per minute.

But the system depends on a current database. Ours is out of date because many residents no longer have a home phone. The dramatic shift to cell phones is great for convenience, but a challenge for the city to contact you with important or safety messages.

We depend on you to register your phones. Your safety may depend on it. If you have eliminated your home phone, you won't get messages unless you register your cell phones.

Please help us help you. Visit cedarhilltx.com/citymessage and register your mobile phone and the phones of all who live at your home so we can know you are getting the message. You can also register to receive emails or text messages. Your phone numbers are safe, we will not sell or give access to your numbers to anyone else.

Research shows that fewer than half of all homes still have a land line. Yet, nearly 90% of our population has a cell phone.

Don't feed the clog



If you generate a lot of cooking oil or grease, don't pour it down the drain, it can cause clogs, expensive for you and for the City.

Recycle your cooking grease by bringing it, in a closed container, to the City Service Center at 1554 S. Clark Rd. between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. weekdays. Check in at the office and they will assist you.

For smaller amounts, pour grease into a closeable container or wipe the warm, not hot, pan with paper towels and place them in the trash.

Putting food scraps into the trash instead of down the garbage disposal can also help prevent a holiday plumbing disaster.


