Cutting your water bill is just a click away

Another hot Texas summer is right around the corner. But that means more than just getting ready for swimsuit weather. Water availability is a critical issue in our State, so summer means it's time to be even more mindful of managing your water consumption. The City of Cedar Hill has made a major upgrade to your water billing system. You can enjoy the benefits of controlling how much water you use and how much money you spend by visiting the FATHOM U2You customer portal.

It's easy and powerful

By going to cedarhill.gwfathom.com, you can now do more than just pay your water bill. The system is designed to help you understand your water consumption and gives you the power to monitor your own water use with water management tools. Once you Sign In and Register your account you can:

- See your daily consumption for the last 30 days
- Compare your water use to neighbors around you
- Learn how your historical daily usage compares to a projected efficiency level
- Set your own consumption thresholds to better control how much you spend
- Receive text or e-mail alerts if you exceed the water threshold you set
- Receive automatic text or e-mail alerts to notify you if a water leak is detected

Check your bill whenever you want

With the FATHOM U2You customer portal, you don't have to wait for your water bill to see how you did. You can proactively monitor your water consumption in real time to better manage water use, limit your spending and conserve water. And you can do it at a time and place that's convenient for you.

Dallas County Health & Human Services advises residents to be aware of guidelines related to the Zika virus.

Avoiding mosquito bites is the best precaution for most residents. Since West Nile Virus is still an issue in this area, similar precautions work to avoid contracting both viruses.

Drain or treat all standing water sources. Use products that include DEET. Wear long, loose, light-colored clothing when outside. Limit outdoor activities during dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.

Chamber honors distinctive individuals and businesses

Aranda Bell, center, who serves as the Adult Services Coordinator for the Zula B. Wylie Public Library. She was honored with the Chairman's Choice Award for her year on the Executive Committee of the Chamber Board, her leadership qualities and outstanding service to the Chamber and the community.

Jenae Franke, right, who was named Woman of the Year for her long-term contributions to the quality of life in the city, demonstrated leadership, cooperation, teamwork and inspiration to others. New this year are the "Growing Green" Green Project of the Year and Green Business Award of the year by Waste Management, Inc. and the City of Cedar Hill.

The Chamber recognized Hillside Village Shopping Center's efforts to include Texas native plants in their landscaping, recycling a third of all non-hazardous solid waste in 2015, incorporating SMART water meters for landscaping, and retrofitting their parking lots with energy-efficient units. These green programs are saving over \$500,000 a year.

First United Methodist Church also incorporated numerous green initiatives this past year including purchasing and scraping a dilapidated home and neglected lot, replacing all lights in their historic sanctuary with low footprint LED bulbs, replacing three HVAC units with high-efficiency units and raising \$11,000 for water.org, an international water well non-profit organization.

In the recent city-wide survey, 89% of the residents said they like living in Cedar Hill. That's a 12% better satisfaction rate than residents reported in cities across the U.S. and 11% better than residents surveyed in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico.

events, like the ones at Walgreens, but this location is available for smaller quantities at any time.

Securing the funding for this collection box was a matter of cooperation between drug abuse prevention groups and the City of Cedar Hill.

What can be disposed?

The lobby unit will accept prescriptions, patches, ointments, over-the counter medications, vitamins, samples and pet medications.

What's not allowed

Hydrogen peroxide, thermometers, inhalers, needles, medication from businesses or clinics, aerosol cans, non-prescription ointments/lotions/liquids.


