## TRI-CITY TALES: HONOR GUARD

Last November, DeSoto Animal Control Officer Michelle Romualdo responded to a call about a stray dog near a local church. When she arrived,

she found a black doodle mix hiding behind the building. As she approached, the dog bolted into a nearby ravine along Ten Mile Creek.

Romualdo assumed he'd be easy to catch with a live trap—bait it with food and wait for the door to shut. But when the dog stepped inside, his back paw held the door open. The trap only scared him off.

Her larger trap was in use, so while waiting for it to become available, Romualdo visited the church daily to feed the dog and keep him nearby. "We were afraid he'd vanish into the ravine forever," she said. Staff began calling him Honor, after a nearby street.

Once she got the larger trap, she began feeding Honor around it so he'd grow comfortable. She set up game cameras to monitor him. By late January, she got close enough to notice something alarming: Honor was still wearing the puppy collar someone had put on him long ago. It wasn't a breakaway design—and now it was embedded in his neck, infected and threatening his windpipe. Catching him became urgent.

Armed with gas station hot dogs, Romualdo set the trap again. This time, it worked. "We were so elated," she said. Honor was taken straight to the shelter's Lifesaving and Learning Center, funded by Friends of Tri-City Animal Shelter. To everyone's relief, the collar hadn't yet damaged his trachea or blood vessels.

The next day, Honor wagged his tail for the first time. It was clear he had once known love. The team nicknamed him "Scruffy," and Romualdo now calls him "The Honorable Mr. Scruffy." He's thriving in foster care—gaining weight, enjoying car rides, and even sliding down playground slides.

"I didn't want him to suffer alone," Romualdo said. "We saved his life. He's one of my favorite catches of all time."
