TRI-CITY TALES: WHEN THE CHIPS ARE DOWN

Ashley Cole was out of town for Thanksgiving when her phone rang on Black Friday. Her pet sitter sounded frantic. Ashley's two dogs, Luna and Oso, had escaped from her backyard in Duncanville after digging out beneath a corner of the fence.

Oso, a Great Pyrenees, has been with Ashley for ten years. He was a puppy when Ashley's boyfriend—now her husband—gave him to her. Luna, a four-year-old yellow lab Ashley calls "everyone's best friend," loves tennis balls, paddleboarding, and following Oso wherever he goes. The two dogs are inseparable and, apparently, skilled escape artists.

At first, Ashley tried not to worry. Luna and Oso had gotten out before, and she and her husband believed they had fixed the problem by burying chicken wire along the fence. Ashley assumed the dogs would return on their own. But hours later, the sitter called again. After two hours of searching Duncanville, there was still no sign of them. Darkness fell, rain began, and Ashley knew Luna was afraid of storms.

Two states away in Alabama, Ashley panicked. She posted urgently on social media and Nextdoor and contacted the emergency line at Tri-City Animal Shelter. Staff responded immediately. No one had brought the dogs in yet, but they asked a question that gave Ashley hope: were the dogs microchipped?

Knowing they were chipped brought some comfort. If Luna and Oso reached a shelter, they could be identified. Ashley tried to sleep, waking often to check her phone.

Around midnight, a Duncanville police officer responded to a report of an injured dog near Santa Fe and Wheatland Roads.

He found a yellow lab with a leg injury and a Great Pyrenees standing guard. When the officer opened his car door, Oso jumped inside. Both dogs were taken to Tri-City, fed, and settled onto warm blankets.

By morning, Ashley learned her dogs were safe. Luna's injury was only a sprain, and she is recovering well. The dogs no longer have unsupervised backyard time. The fence has been reinforced again, and GPS collars are on the way.

Ashley believes microchipping made all the difference. Two other Pyrenees picked up that same night were not chipped and were still waiting for their owners. She credits the shelter staff for their care and quick action.

FIRST RESPONDERS BECAME SANTA'S HELPERS
