



It's all about the *Vision*

Planning for change has helped Cedar Hill weather changing times. Having a vision is critical. That was a key element of Mayor Rob Franke's State of the City message at the December Chamber of Commerce luncheon at Northwood University.

Maintaining stability in an unstable world is a challenge that our community has faced and achieved, he said, from the boom days of the 90s through the recent lean years.

The level of plan-

ning by our City Councils and administration is unmatched, he said. That planning has positioned us for upcoming opportunities. "It's all about envisioning what we can be."

Still progressing

On screen, his graphics showed the flat growth recently. "But what we sometimes overlook" he said, "is the progress we have made. Our bond ratings, the measuring stick of a city's

financial state, are steady or improving and we have many intangibles."

City staff does an amazing job of providing a high level of service to residents. They do it from the heart. Innovative and cost-saving ideas spring from our employees.

Our police and fire departments have been recognized far beyond our City for their achievements.

And we continue to improve, he said, in ways like our Growing Green initiative that has brought solar panels, electric vehicles and more long-term, innovative ideas.

City administration has located and qualified us for well over a million dollars of state and federal grant funding in the last year.

Getting greener

We have substantially increased our recycling as a community, reducing our contribution to limited landfill space. Our once a week trash/recycling collection has reduced carbon emissions and made our streets safer by reducing the number of trucks in our neighborhoods.

Speaking of safety, we continue to be the safest city in South-

west Dallas County. Our police department clears cases at 45%, more than twice the rate of other cities.

You voters recently approved the Crime Control District that will, with no new tax revenues, support our Police And Community Together (PACT) division that works directly with neighborhood residents to reduce crime.

Heart of the City

Historic downtown is becoming an amazing place where we see movement toward transit-oriented development opportunities. "Walkability" he said,

At the recent kick-off meeting of the latest phase of input and planning for downtown, Mayor Rob Franke gave a short history of development in Cedar Hill and said version 3.0 offers exciting opportunities for our community.

Don Gore, City Planner, said our City Center can be a memorable destination. But, he told the group, it requires input and participation from residents, businesses, grant funding, developers and possibly a special bond.

The City Center Plan aims to create a walkable place to live, work, shop and play.

Uptown, Midtown and historic Downtown will complement each other and highlight our local character. A regional rail station will serve workers, shoppers and visitors.

More than just a transit stop, downtown development will include vibrant public gathering spaces, new types of housing and the kinds of businesses that will make downtown Cedar Hill a destination, bringing visitors from out of town



here to enjoy our city.

Trail takes shape

Red Oak Creek Trail will, when completed by the end of 2013, connect Virginia Weaver Park to Dot Thomas Park, and the Cedar Trails neighborhood to the Rec Center. Pedestrians will have access to Permenter Middle School and the High School.

Three miles in length, this trail is the next segment in a city-wide trail system, part of the Parks, Recreation, Trails & Open Space Visioning Master Plan (to download the plan visit cedarhilltx.com and in the search box enter "open space")

The trail will be concrete, 12 feet wide, with landscaped ame-



nities. It will be handicapped accessible and wide enough for walking, running, biking and roller blading.

Most of the funding (\$2,500,000) is a grant from Dallas County. The City's Community Development Corporation is funding the remaining \$500,000.

The final implementation of the trail includes many revisions resulting from public meetings staff held to solicit input.

Although it's already under construction, a formal groundbreaking is planned in January. Watch the city website for details.
